#### Centripetal Faith: Part 6—The Way of Jesus

Text: Matthew 5:38-48

# Warming Up

## Questions:

- 1. What is your favorite part of the Virginia Mennonite Relief Sale?
- 2. What do you find one of the most difficult teachings of Jesus?

## **Digging In**

### Read Matthew 5:38-42.

The word for "resist" here is *antistenai*, which literally means to "stand against". But in Jesus' day it was used of *violently* standing against. When scholars translated the Hebrew Scriptures into Greek, *antistenai* is what they used of armies coming against each other. Jesus isn't telling us *not* to resist, but instead to not *violently* resist. Turning the other cheek, giving up your coat, going the second mile were ways Jesus invited his disciples to resist *nonviolently*.

#### Questions:

- 1. Why do you think Jesus invited his disciples to be nonviolent?
- 2. Why do you think Jesus encouraged his disciples to resist (even if it was nonviolently)?
- 3. How did Jesus model both nonviolence and resistance in his life?

#### Read Leviticus 19:18.

Here is the passage that Jesus quotes in Matthew 5:42. Notice, in Leviticus, who the neighbor *is*: a fellow Israelite, believer, blood brother (or sister).

#### Read Deuteronomy 11:13-17.

Notice who gets rain and who doesn't get rain in the Torah: those who are obedient, who follow the commandments, who are *righteous* get rain so their crops can grow and come it. Those who are not obedient, who are *unrighteous* don't get rain: no crops, no blessing, no *love*.

With these two passages in mind, listen to the teaching of Jesus: Read Matthew 5:43-48.

#### Questions:

- 1. In what ways in particular is Jesus challenging the message of the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament)?
- 2. Thinking back to the story of the Good Samaritan, who does Jesus say is our neighbor?
- 3. Why do you think Jesus is going out of his way to reframe these Old Testament texts?
- 4. How is the Jesus way different from the American way when it comes to our neighbors and our adversaries?

## Sending Out

Read Luke 6:27-36.

#### Questions:

- 1. In what ways has Luke added to or further explained the teaching of Jesus recorded in Matthew 5?
- 2. What about Luke's version is more challenging or difficult?
- 3. What word does Luke use in place of "perfect" from Matthew's Gospel account?
- 4. How does that change your understanding of what perfection Jesus is inviting us to strive for?
- 5. To whom do you think the church needs to extend more mercy, love, or blessing?
- 6. To whom in your life do you need to extend more mercy, love, or blessing?

## Closing

Take a moment in silence to come before God and ask the question, "What word or phrase or idea or moment does God want me to remember from this morning and carry with me this week?"
